Nov. 5 - Women in Leadership Speakers series, Toronto - Sarah Ryerson, Head of Strategy and Sales Operations, Google Canada, will present her personal career journey.

Nov. 12 - CASL Look Ahead, Toronto - Hear from the CRTC on their approach to the computer programming provisions of Canada's anti-spam law (Section 8) that come into effect Jan. 15, 2015.

Nov. 12 - Ingenious Awards, Toronto - The ICT community comes together to celebrate the most innovative projects from across the country.

- Shared Services Canada (SSC) wants to save \$150 million by consolidating contracts and keeping internal overhead low, \$50 million by moving government departments to a single, outsourced email service and \$9 million by consolidating the procurement of workplace technology devices like laptops and printers.
- Before SSC, each of the government's 43 department had its own vehicle for delivering ICT. In the end, there will be one system all departments will share.
- 63 legacy email systems from all across government are being folded into one system. When it's done, she said it will be secure and deliver millions of dollars in savings to taxpayers every year. The system will be secure and much more capable of dealing with issues like cyber-espionage from abroad.
- The government is committed to leveraging Canada's ICT industry capabilities.
- A Data Centre Consolidation project is going to eliminate up to 50 facilities. At the end of the project, the data centre footprint will shrink from 485 to 7.
- Nearly 22,000 phone lines have been removed in favour of cellular and voice-over-IP.
- The government is committed to helping Canadians to be secure online. It has invested \$155 million to hire new staff to reinforce cybersecurity capabilities
- It has established and is now operating the Cyber Threat Evaluation Centre

Microsoft Canada Sees Growth in the Cloud

As Microsoft transitions to a cloud-computing and mobile-friendly software company under the leadership of CEO Satya Nadella, the tech heavyweight is setting its sights on Canada's small and medium-sized businesses.

It's a major segment of the Canadian economy which is largely unfamiliar with cloud computing, according to survey results Microsoft released this week.

Microsoft Canada is targeting this pool of potential customers by raising awareness, such as with a \$13-million "technology showcase" at its Mississauga, Ont. headquarters to demonstrate the cloud's potential, and a similar Centre opening in Montreal next week, said Janet Kennedy, the president of Microsoft Canada.
